
Hurricane Season. It begins

June 1 to Nov 30

Houston is ~50 miles to Gulf of Mexico

| Category | Wind Speed [mph] | Storm Surge [ft] | Damage |
|----------|-----------------------|------------------|--------------|
| 1 | 74-95 | 4-5 | Minimal |
| 2 | 96-110 | 6-8 | Moderate |
| 3 | 111-130 | 9-12 | Major |
| 4 | <mark>1</mark> 31-155 | 13-18 | Extensive |
| 5 | >155 | >18 | Catastrophic |

- Listen for the news via radio/TV

- Know when it is better to stay put in a well constructed, secure structure
- Turn off utilities if instructed
- Keep a freshwater supply
- Keep food safe
